### Haystack Rock Awareness Program Names Angela Reynolds Whitlock Inagural "Steward of the Year"

After decades recognizing a Volunteer of the Year, the Haystack Rock Awareness Program brain trust had an "a-ha" moment: Why weren't similar honors being extended to paid staff?

And, thus, HRAP's Steward of the Year was born.

The award spotlights a member of the seasonal staff who goes above and beyond in their dedication to education and conservation at Haystack Rock.

"This is an hourly job," says Program Director Kelli Ennis, "so I don't expect staff to put in time or thoughts outside of those hours--especially for a seasonal job; it's not something most employers would expect."

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Yet, in their dedication to environmental protection, many members of the HRAP team rise well above the basics of their job descriptions.

And when it came time to decide who to honor with the inaugural Steward of the Year award, the choice was clear: Angela Reynolds Whitlock.

"Angela is exact embodiment of what stewardship is," Ennis says. "She's so passionate."

As it happens, HRAP isn't the first organization to commemorate Whitlock's stewardship. She received stewardship recognition from the Oregon Shores Conservation Coalition while studying at Clatsop Community College.

Whitlock took up classes in environmental science studies at Clatsop after some 25 years working as a jewelry maker. While she loved goldsmithing, the job was taking a toll.

"After 25 years at a workbench, at a mostly sedentary job, focusing on micro-movements, and my body started protesting," Whitlock says.

"I knew I needed to be upright and outdoors," Whitlock continues. She applied and was hired by HRAP in March of 2020. "It was almost like this job was designed for my wishes. It fit exactly what I needed, perfectly."

"That first day out on the beach at the tidepools, I was like that little kid that wanted to be a marine biologist," she says. "And it sparked all this joy. I just became so immersed."

Forming intense connections with the Haystack Rock ecosystem, says Education and Volunteer Coordinator Lisa Habecker, is not uncommon.

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"You eat, sleep and dream this rock," Habecker says. "It's one of those things: with this job, once the rock sucks you in, you're in its hold forever. And it has definitely captured Angela."

Once Whitlock was hired, she dove in head first.

"Angela empowers herself with knowledge," Habecker says. "She's constantly educating herself and asking questions. She's always looking to improve."

And while working on the beach might sound like a dream job, it's not without challenges.

Rain or shine, Whitlock and the team work an ever-shifting schedule (determined by the tides), showing up in the office as early as 5:00AM to prepare for a beach shift or staying until sunset as late as 9:00PM.

Visitors, while often gracious, can occasionally be difficult when being asked not to climb, leash their dogs, or to refrain from collecting living creatures like Sea Stars.

"There will be days where everyone thanks you," Ennis says. "And then there will be days where you feel like every visitor is trying to make you feel like an inconvenience and that you are ruining their vacation. There are some days when it's overwhelming."

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When it comes to challenging interactions, here too Whitlock excels.

"Angela is one of our go-to staff for difficult visitors who need to be handled with care," Ennis says. "She has a calm presence, always focusing on the positive."

"My ultimate goal is not to shame people, but inform them," Whitlock says. "I like to share that I came here as a kid to the coast with my family. We were fishing, hiking and crabbing and I climbed all over everything. But now that I know, I do better. And I think people appreciate that."

Whitlock's favorite part of the job--and there are many--is assisting with school field trips.

"The kids are inheriting this earth from us," Whitlock says, "and I want to instill some inspiration in them to help them care about the oceans."

Whitlock's devotion to conservation extends beyond HRAP. She volunteers up and down the coast with the Oregon Shores Conservation Coalition, is involved with community science projects like marine debris and seabird monitoring surveys. She also helped launch the North Coast Land Conservancy's Tidepool Ambassador program at Cape Falcon.

Wherever Whitlock is, Haystack Rock is never far from her mind.

"We regularly we get messages, photos and texts from Angela, sharing ideas, things she's seeing, what other organizations are doing," Ennis says. "Even while she's on vacation she's sending things." (While touring another nature reserve, Whitlock suggested a new sign design for HRAP that reduced trampling significantly.)

The rewards of working at Haystack Rock, Whitlock says, can be profound.

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She recalls a recent shift when she was asked by a visitor to point out some cool tidepool creatures. The visitor, filming with her phone, translated Whitlock's response into Spanish.

"It turns out {the visitor} was from Columbia and her sister was back in Columbia with a classroom of young girls from underprivileged backgrounds," Whitlock says. "And she and her sister were showing the students about the world that they hadn't had the opportunity to see for themselves."

Whitlock ended up hosting an impromptu virtual private tour.

"The kids wanted to wave goodbye and I saw this classroom of little girls and I just wanted to cry," Whitlock says.

It was just one of many meaningful interactions Whitlock has enjoyed on the beach.

"I found that my personal mission of loving this area so much and wanting to do everything I could to protect it lined up exactly with HRAP's mission," Whitlock says. "I think we do so much good."

To that end, Whitlock often shares a joke with Ennis:

"She pays me," Whitlock says, "but I would come out and do this for free."

"It's definitely more than just a job," Whitlock adds. "I've found what I feel very passionate about and want to dedicate the rest of my life to."




