Farmers Market Returns Tuesday, June 14th

The Cannon Beach Farmers Market--teeming with fresh and local fruits, veggies and more--returns Tuesday, June 14th.

Farmers Market Manager Philomena Lloyd is excited not only to share another summer season of produce, flowers and other local offerings with the community, but for the market to return to something more resembling its pre-pandemic form.

"We will be back more like we were in 2019," Lloyd says.

That means more vendors (around 30) than there were last year (around 25).

"We have some folks who opted out last year because of covid who are now coming back," Lloyd says. "Now they're saying they're ready to go."

On offer at the market will be products from four different produce farms, two berry farms, flower growers and a smattering of other locally harvested offerings including smoked and cured meats, organic teas, spice mixes, nuts, pasta and more.



The quality available at the market, Lloyd says, is unmatched.

"There's no comparison with a fresh, ripe tomato picked this morning from an organic farm to what you're going to find at the grocery store," Lloyd says. "There's no comparison in the nutrients, the freshness or the flavor."

Along with produce and other ingredients, the market will present two venders providing ready-to-eat meals. Salmon River Smokehouse will offer salmon salads and hot chowder; Bamford Bakeshop will provide sandwiches.

While enamored with so much of what the market provides, Lloyd looks forward especially to the sauerkraut from Greenville Farms.

"It's the most incredible sauerkraut I've ever had," Lloyd says. "And I know sauerkraut."

The market, which runs every Tuesday from 1-5PM through September 27th, also boasts live music each week. Performers run the gamut from familiar local artists to regional touring acts coming from as far as Seattle.

And while it's a great place to shop, mingle and nosh on any given Tuesday afternoon, Lloyd sees the market--which was created in search of greater community-sufficiency after the storm of 2007 interrupted deliveries--as something more.

"Your neighbors are supporting you with healthy nutrients for your body and you're supporting them economically," Lloyd says. "It's a reciprocal relationship, and very different from buying something that is shipped in from halfway across the world."

"This farmers market is vital to the community," Lloyd adds. "And the community is vital to the vendors."

All of this could not be possible, Lloyd points out, without support from the City of Cannon Beach and the market's team of nearly 20 volunteers.

To them, Lloyd tips her cap. "This market is able to be great," she says, "because of the many amazing volunteers within our community."

"LTOGTL" was his awkward acronym for "Let The Other Guy Turn Left".



It's mentioned in Cannon Beach's Comprehensive Plan. Many of the city's ordinances, too, use language referring to this "character."


But what is "village character?"




