Emergency Management A Status Report with Rick Hudson

Emergency Manager Rick Hudson joined the City of Cannon Beach in February 2020. Just a month into his new job, Covid-19 struck.

In responding to the pandemic, his skills were put immediately to the test.

And while reacting to the unprecedented virus added much to his plate, Hudson has been busy strengthening Cannon Beach's ability and capacity to respond to other emergencies, as he detailed in a presentation to City Council last month. Two years in to a four-year buildup, Hudson says he's "right on track."

An Emergency Management Update With Rick Hudson

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"When I started, there was only a small framework, little cache sites, and some satellite phones that were not well trained on," he adds.

In his two years on the job, Hudson highlights a number of additions to the city's emergency response capacity, including:

- **Increased Communication Capabilities**. In addition to satellite phones, Cannon Beach has developed HAM and GMRS radio services; added high frequency internet service; partnered with KMUN to increase radio with the rest of Clatsop County and added connectivity south to Arcadia, Falcon Cove and Arch Cape



- **Expanded Cache Sites**. "We have at least doubled if not tripled the occupancy of the cache sites," Hudson says of the storage areas above the Tsunami zone. The increases include food, water, tools and shelter. Says Hudson: "We now have cache sites where you could not just open a barrel, but open a camp."

- Established Emergency Operations Centers at both City Hall and the Public Works yard.

- **Increased Planning**. "We developed a communication plan and emergency operation guidelines for almost all types of events," Hudson says, including: earthquakes, tsunami, wildfires, landslides and other extreme weather, localized sheltering, mass evacuations and more. Hudson says he prefers clear, simple plans that can be understood and adopted by staff and volunteers in the event of emergency.

- **Organizing Emergency Volunteers**. Hudson has worked with and helped coordinate groups like the Medical Reserve Corps, Community Emergency Response Team, Disaster Animal Response Team and others.

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- **Bringing Community Together**. Hudson has worked to increase communications between the city and its citizens, businesses and other organizations including police, the fire district and more. This includes the development of community announcement services as well as inperson relationship building.

Indeed, Covid-19 showed the need for increased communications within the community.

"I feel like we've been able to bring together people in the community who may not have been together before Covid happened," Hudson says.

In the years to come, Hudson foresees the continued fortification and expansion of cache sites, further development of emergency volunteers and increased community education.

Also on the table for 2022 is a potential takeover and updating of the COWS emergency warning siren system.

"I think COWS has a lot of value," Hudson says. "I'm hoping that the City Council will approve of taking over operations from the fire district and lift this thing up and bring it into the new generation. It's a big, huge project."

Looking forward, Hudson says: "My objective is to build the infrastructure of a sustainable program."

"The important thing about building a program like this is making sure it's not dependent on one person," he adds. "If I have a heart attack these programs need to have a heartbeat going forward."

Indeed, it takes a village.

Public Works Secures a Special, Low-interest Loan to Install Earthquake-Resistant Water Pipes

Should an earthquake or tsunami hit Cannon Beach, most of the City's aging water pipes would be destroyed.

With resiliency in mind, Public Works developed a plan to replace the 50-year-old concrete and asbestos pipes that deliver water from the city's spring to the treatment plant and into town.



The replacement pipe is flexible, designed to withstand a seismic event.

Once the new pipe is installed, if an earthquake occurs, Cannon Beach should have access to fresh, clean water within 72 hours.

This project is made possible by the securing of a low-interest loan, which was recently approved by Business Oregon, the state's economic development agency.

The \$3.2 million loan is offered at a special interest rate of just 1% and includes \$515,000 in principal forgiveness--essentially lowering the cost to \$2.7 million.

According to Public Works Director Karen LaBonte, a traditional loan at market rates would carry interest rates around 8 to 9%.

"It's almost like free money," LaBonte says of the special low-interest rate. "Shy of a grant this is the next best thing."

Shepherding the project's approval with Business Oregon has been a long road.

"It's a very complicated process," LaBonte says. "It's similar to getting a mortgage on a house. The paperwork is vast. It's taken us about 18 months to get where we are."

Replacing the water pipe is the second of three phases in the city's long-term water resiliency plan.

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The first, installing seismic valves on the city's water tanks--which will automatically shut off in the event of an emergency--was made possible by a similar low-interest loan and significant principal forgiveness from Business Oregon.

The third phase of the water resiliency plan, which is still being developed, would replace current water tanks in order to withstand a seismic event.

On the replacement pipe, LaBonte says she expects work to begin in the next six to 12 months.

Of the project and favorable loan, LaBonte says, "It's a huge win for the city."

Prior to becoming a police officer, I worked for the Oregon Department of Human Services Child Welfare as a Child Protective Services Worker. I have also been a United States Park Ranger and an Officer/Watch Commander with the University of New Mexico Health Sciences Center.

After 15 years of serving this community, I have never lost the ability to be thankful and appreciate the ability to work in Cannon Beach.

In my free time, I enjoy fishing from my drift boat and playing the bagpipes.

- 1. Genuine has an embedded security thread which reads "USA 100" when held up to light.
- 2. Genuine has a 3-D security ribbon that moves when tilted:
 - 1) Liberty Bells change to 100s
 - 2) Liberty Bells and 100s move in two directions (left and right & up and down) and always the OPPOSITE direction of the note tilt
- 3. Genuine has a security watermark of Franklin on the right side which can be viewed when held up to light.
- 4. Genuine has a color shifting ink that changes from copper to green when tilting the note.

If anyone attempts to pass one of the above described counterfeit notes, please obtain as much information as possible about the individual(s) and contact your local Police department and U.S. Secret Service office.

- 2.Address specific numbers such as mobile numbers, mobile texts, e-mail, and fax numbers are not included in the emergency contact list and require a manual sign-up.

 - Members of Council, Commissions, Boards and Committees may attend in person or via Zoom
