Tufted Puffins Return to Haystack Rock for Breeding

Many visitors to Cannon Beach consider the early sunrise hours to be the quietest and calmest time of day, but veteran birders might state otherwise.

The early hours at Haystack Rock are often bustling with activity, Oystercatcher pairs darting across the marine garden as their signature trill echoes, Gulls dropping mussels or picking at Dungeness Crabs, Common Murres circling the perimeter, Pigeon Guillemots bobbing in the surf, and of course, Tufted Puffins stoically looking around from the grassy meadows in front of their burrows.

April and May mark the beginning of nesting season for many sea and shore birds, the iconic Tufted Puffin is no exception. Every March the Staff Interpreters at the Haystack Rock Awareness Program (HRAP) make picks at when they think the first sighting will be and which of them will snap a photograph first.

Tufted Puffins First Sighted on April 4th

HRAP Volunteer and Education Coordinator Lisa Habecker explains, "We are always on high alert from April 1st until the 15th, mostly the first week where we sit on pins and needles, waiting to see who will be the first interpreter to bag a puffin - figuratively of course!"

According to officials from U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the 2022 breeding season saw an estimated 98 individual Tufted Puffins at Haystack Rock, down from the previous years of about 120. The downward population count is part of a multi-state trend seen along the California Current. The Tufted Puffin was recently denied Endangered Species Act (ESA) protections in 2020, but that hasn't stopped efforts from organizations such as Friends of Haystack Rock and National Audubon on working towards boosting conservation and protective efforts.

Threats to the Tufted Puffin include climate change, fisheries bycatch, oil spills, decreasing forage fish populations, and natural predation from birds of prey such as the Bald Eagle. Many birders will note the increased predation activity from the latter at Haystack Rock making spotting Tufted Puffins an increasingly elusive task; the Bald Eagle itself is an icon of the success of the ESA having been removed from the list in 2007 due to increased and stable population growth.

Despite these challenges, the Tufted Puffin can still be spotted, though often with great patience, at Haystack Rock. HRAP staff can help keep you updated on recent activity and assist in sharing techniques to spotting the bird in flight or on the rock. HRAP Director Kelli Ennis tells us, "We celebrate the return of the puffins every year, aside from being an icon of Cannon Beach, we are genuinely worried for the year they never return. It is always a sigh of relief, and a most strikingly beautiful one at that."



Mike Benefield, A Familiar Face in a New Role

After ending his nine-year tenure on the City Council, Mike Benefield can still be seen around City Hall, but now with a new title – Project Manager and Engineer.

"People were worried what I'd do when I was off the council, I said I'd fill up the days, but I didn't know it would be this." Benefield explains that the new role is evolving, initially he began as a volunteer. "When I was on council, we approved the position and budget, but nobody qualified applied, so I said I would be happy to help."

The new position focuses on Public Works Water Resiliency Projects, intended to strengthen, and prepare the City's water infrastructure against natural disasters such as earthquakes. Benefield acts as a link between the City and Windsor Engineering, ensuring someone is always available to review plans, oversee the project, and ask or answer questions.

Benefield explains, "My role is as a liaison, not an inspector. I observe and provide my expertise. I'm also here to make sure we stay within budget and identify anything we can do better or more efficiently."

Benefield's professional and technical background qualifies him for this unique position, and it allows him to continue to learn how the field has changed. "I've been retired for 25 years – it's different now, many things are the same and familiar, but I'm also learning new things."

He is also learning to work within a new professional landscape that many workers have been adjusting to in the past few years, "There's a bit of remote work which is new to me. Usually, I'm with the crew in the field or in the office planning, now I'm kind of in between those two."

Learning something new isn't unfamiliar to Benefield who has spent his entire life being active and adaptable, "My whole life I've been a problem solver; I never once stepped into a job that had actually existed before I got there, it always came about because someone needed help, or something needed solving."

Benefield goes on to explain his inquiring nature, "as the project moves on, I know I'm going to get pulled in deeper and deeper, if something doesn't make sense to me, I'm going to follow up."

This role fills the ever-growing list of activities Mike Benefield has been a part of during his retirement. From consulting to skiing, hiking, kayaking, off-roading, traveling, restoring cars, and moving to Cannon Beach where he joined the planning commission and later city council, Benefield has never been an idle-minded person. "Am I enjoying it? I'd say it's interesting, I find most things in life interesting. Never thought I'd seek employment, but I see opportunities and find myself thinking 'oh I should do this, or I should do that."

Benefield doesn't hesitate to share his fondness for the team he works with, "The Public Works people, I just think they're the greatest. These are the City's ambassadors; people see them out all the time. The City has an excellent crew in finance, and we have a City Manager who I think is a real visionary." He also goes on to explain the importance of this work, "This master plan is great. As Rick Hudson [Emergency Manager] and Bruce St. Denis [City Manager] have said multiple times, you can live for a while without food, but not water, we need resilience."

Meet Jett Johnston, the Newest Member of the Public Works Team

With a bright smile and friendly demeanor, Jett Johnston reflects on his past month as the newest Wastewater Utility Worker at the City of Cannon Beach, "Overall it has been really fun, I'm now starting to get familiar with the basics, the maintenance, and what problem to be on the lookout for."

Johnston has been in this role since April 3rd, but public works isn't a new to him, between his previous work with Advance Excavation, Nehalem Telecom, and Public Works at the City of Wheeler Johnston has a range of field experience.

"I was a bit of a Swiss Army Knife [at Wheeler], did a little bit of everything depending what was needed. Cannon Beach is much bigger comparatively, it's an insane difference, I loved it there, but this is a nice step up."

While he may be a new face in town, Johnston is quite familiar with the coast, "I've lived here my whole life. I love to go fishing at Barview Jetty, especially night fishing." Though he admits not being quite as familiar with Cannon Beach itself, "If people see me, please come say hi! I always love meeting new people and would really enjoy learning more about Cannon Beach, since I'm from farther south I don't really know anything yet, I'd be happy to become familiar with the restaurants and learn more about this community."

When he's not out harvesting rockfish, Johnston can be found hiking with his young dog, a 2-year-old Siberian Husky named Maverick. And in case you're wondering, "Yes, he is named after Top Gun; I recently rewatched the original before seeing the new one and knew my dog had to be named Maverick."

Water Shut Off Moratorium Ending

Since early 2020 in response to the economic impacts of the Covid-19 Pandemic, the City of Cannon Beach has been observing a moratorium on water shutoff notifications and fees on past due utility bills.

Per the May 2nd Council Meeting, the city will end the temporary moratorium and begin observing Ordinance 13.18.050 within the Municipal Code. The first water bill to be impacted will be June 2023. Notices will be sent by e-mail.

Residents should make sure their current contact information including mailing address, phone number, and e-mail are provided to the City Finance Department.


